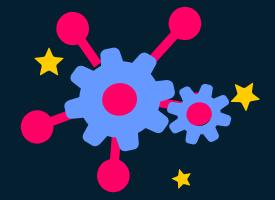
My Goals for Students

Workplace context: Library Techs often have to work independently without much supervision. Annual reviews are common.

2. CREATING THE ASSIGNMENT

The framework, instructions, and format

The Assignment Framework

- Students write a discussion post each week.
- In each portfolio the student selects one or more discussion posts and at least one response or reply for 3 total work samples.
- Students complete 3 portfolios during the semester and assign their own grade for each.



What are the low-stakes assignments that students do regularly in your classes?

The Assignment Instructions

- Use the rubric I provide to select best work samples.
- Answer evaluative questions about each work sample.
- Connect the skill practiced in each sample to workplace expectations.
- > Set goals for performance improvement.

The Rubric, i.e., how students know if you did their work well

Dimensions

- Completeness
- Accuracy
- Clarity
- Synthesis

Performance Levels

- Advanced Expert
- Emerging Expert
- Developing
- Beginning
- No Evidence

The Portfolio: Examples of Reflection Questions

The Class

What are the strengths/ weaknesses in terms of meeting the course requirements?

The Workplace

What are the strengths/ weaknesses in terms of how you are preparing yourself to meet your [library] work goals?

Setting Goals

List 2-5 [public services] learning goals you have set for yourself based on your experience in this class and list the steps you will take to achieve each goal.

Reflection *** Questions

What class, workplace, and goal-setting questions would be meaningful for your field and your students?

3. CONSIDERATIONS

Strengths, weaknesses, and my goals for improvement

Strengths

- Focused -- eye on the prize of library work
- Directed -- have a goal and know how to achieve it
- Valued -- recognizing students' skills and abilities
- Engaged -- students have to reflect on whether or not they have effectively participated

Weaknesses

- Nurtured? -- students may not feel that I'm a big enough part of this process which might lead some to believe that I don't care
- Connected? -- the portfolio is very individual, though the discussion assignments on which they are based are meant to connect students

Students' feedback

- It's hard to give myself full credit, but the rubric gives me evidence so I can
- > It's hard, but useful to look back at work I've already done
- It pushed me to find areas for improvement even in my best work
- It gave me a more critical way to evaluate my work rather than just receive a grade for my work
- It was tedious because I was already very aware of how the assignments served or did not serve my library goals
