DATA & RESEARCH COMMITTEE

The Data & Research Committee is currently reviewing regional research projects developed in Tableau, a data visualization tool that allows readers to interact with data. There are two products in Tableau: 1.) a labor market demand and supply analyzer and 2.) a knowledge, skills, and abilities (KSA) analyzer. The committee is testing the tools and providing feedback before they are released this summer. Additionally, in April, the SDIC Center of Excellence for Labor Market Research (COE) released six labor market briefs, including Web Developers, Computer User Support Specialists, Accounting Occupations, and others. The Regional Career Education Marketing project continues to make significant progress toward the goal of increasing CE enrollment by one percent annually. The priority sector college photoshoot has been completed, and photographs are currently being reviewed and edited. All photos from this shoot will be used in regional and individual campus marketing efforts. The Improving the Student Enrollment Experience project is wrapping up at MiraCosta, and is on track to hand-off in May 2019. Grossmont and Cuyamaca are quickly progressing and have been socializing the project to stakeholder groups at both campuses. Palomar has signed on to work with Civilian on this effort, and will engage in a partial website redesign. A meeting to review the proposed scope of work is scheduled for May 8, 2019.

K-14 CAREER PATHWAYS WORKGROUP

The K-12 Selection Committee (SC) completed its work of evaluating the K-12 applications for the \$14.7 million K-12 SWP funding on Friday, April 26th. Chancellor's Office will announce the LEAs that were funded on April 30th. All of the K-12 community will have the opportunity to ask questions and provide feedback on the process for distributing the funding in order to make improvements to the process next year. The K-12 to Community College mapping project update was shared with the committee on April 16th, and will be shared with the wider K-12 community on May 22nd. Attendees will have the opportunity to give input on the next steps for the career mapping project. The Career Pathways workgroup held Middle/High School and Adult Education/Noncredit strategic planning sessions in April. The purpose of the planning meetings is to set specific goals for the two areas in support of achieving the Career Pathways goals.

WORK-BASED LEARNING/JOB PLACEMENT WORKGROUP

The workgroup is continuing to develop out the work processes around job placement, work-based learning, and employer engagement. These processes will help inform from a regional perspective where regional collaboration is possible and what types of technology solutions could help connect students to the colleges, careers, and employers. We look forward to sharing more detailed information at your May 6th SDICCCA meeting. Fifty-four classroom faculty, counseling faculty, and career center staff representing each of the region's ten institutions have become certified to teach New World of Work's 21st Century Skills Curriculum. The curriculum includes ten dimensions of skills that are the most in demand by employers such as adaptability, analysis, collaboration, communication and digital fluency, to name a few. The region made a commitment to embed these skills in coursework throughout students' journeys at our colleges. The New World of Work is one delivery system for the 21st Century Skills curriculum. In the coming months, we will be sharing a new investment with you that will integrate 21st Century skills across the curricula in our colleges.

TUTORING WORKGROUP

The CTE Tutoring Survey has closed, and the workgroup is diving into the data from over 1,500 respondents, analyzing both quantitative and qualitative data. More than 1,100 written comments were received, and are providing a depth of insight into the development of themes and recommendations for CTE Tutoring in the region. The report will be delivered to WDC on May 10th.

EMPLOYER ENGAGEMENT WORKGROUP
