Manufacturing in Action at SeeScan: Behind the Tools & Technology

On Oct. 17, 15 students from Cuyamaca College, San Diego Mesa College and San Diego City College (SDCC) had the opportunity to explore San Diego-based SeeScan's state-of-the-art manufacturing facilities. Attendees were students from engineering, manufacturing, and computer-aided drafting and design programs who got to see firsthand how the company designs, engineers and builds professional tools — from subsea lights and cameras to utility locating gear and plumbing diagnostic systems.

Solar Turbines Hosts Education Partners

Thanks to an introduction facilitated by the SDI RC, education partners from East County Adult Education, Grossmont Union High School District and Imperial Valley College (IVC) were invited to tour Solar Turbines' Kearny Mesa facility on Oct. 20, where Production/Test Supervisor Mike Nielson shared insights into the company's hiring focuses and goals of recruiting skilled mechanics and technicians. The tour brought together educators and workforce partners dedicated to expanding career pathways in advanced manufacturing. Collaborations like these reflect SDI RC's ongoing commitment to fostering connections that lead to meaningful industry-education partnerships.
